Church Sheltering Project

“For I was a stranger and you welcomed me.” (Matthew 25:35)

The churches in Bismarck-Mandan have been asked to participate in a project to provide temporary housing for women and children in the cold winter months. This is a joint project with Faith Communities, The Missouri Valley Coalition for Homeless, and Missouri Slope Areawide United Way. At this time eight churches in Bis-Man have stepped forward and registered for this project.

The Churches United for The Homeless (Fargo-Moorhead) has successfully implemented this program and written manuals for the churches and the volunteers. They have laid the ground work and developed a program and worked out the bugs. We can use their model and implement the program in Bis-Man.

The McCabe Trustees have given their approval to the concept and are researching the details. The information will also be shared with the Council on Ministries and the Administrative Board.

Through an effort by the Missouri Valley Coalition for Homeless People and the local faith community, MSA United Way is asking for your commitment to shelter those seeking protection from the cold winter weather. Thank you for your compassion and willingness to serve our neighbors in greatest need.

Who will be sheltered?

Temporary shelter will be provided for 5-7 families (up to 35 people) in a church.

When will guests be sheltered?

From Sunday, November 4, 2012 through Saturday March 3, 2013. Temporary shelter will be provided on a weekly, rotating basis at churches – Sunday night through Saturday night. Guests will be dropped off at 10pm and picked up at 7am each day (times may be slightly adjusted).

Who will screen guests?

Prior to arrival, local homeless shelter staff will assess overflow needs and which families can be safely sheltered in a church setting.

What support will be provided to the church?

- Volunteer training
 - Coordination of supplies
- Ongoing support and communication

What are churches asked to provide?

- Congregational support
 - 1 Church coordinator
 - 4 volunteers each night of shelter (2 male and 2 female)
 - Additional volunteers to:
 - Deliver supplies to the next church at end of week
 - Clean up each morning
 - Set up bedding and other supplies prior to each night
 - Collect bedding linens/blankets into laundry bags each morning
- Provide evening snacks and morning coffee and snacks



Two McCabe Youth Earn Eagle Scout Award

Nick Wax and Nathan Briggs have completed a rigorous list of requirements to earn the award of Eagle Scout. These requirements include earning specific badges, exercising leadership skills, and doing community service. The final phase of this work is to initiate and complete a special project that benefits an organization in the community.



Nick Wax got the idea for his project after hearing Pastor Ray Baker say in a sermon that he wished the church had a way to record on DVD the church worship service which may be given to members who are not able to attend. Nick offered to look into the possibility of the idea. He talked to church leaders and people with financial resources, then put together a plan to do it. Nick reports that all the committees and leaders of McCabe helped him in many ways. He worked with Dakota Sound to do the equipment design that would give the church the capability to record the service on DVD, and to project the live service on the large screen in the Great Hall. Nick worked many hours helping the professionals to install the camera and pull the wires to carry the video signal to the recording equipment and to the projection system in the Great Hall. He had several scout friends who helped in doing the work.

Nick is the son of members Peter and Sherry Wax who supported him throughout his scouting projects. He attends the Saturday evening services with his parents and younger sister, Helen. Nick is a senior in high school. He is interested in tinkering with computers.

Nathan Briggs talked to a family friend on the Bismarck Park Board and learned that the flood had caused serious damage to deck/patio areas surrounding some of the animal exhibits at the Bismarck Zoo. Nathan and the zoo director decided that the wooden patio at the wolf exhibit would be a good project. The old deck boards had to be taken off and new boards needed to be cut and fastened in place. A number of Nathan's scout friends helped with the labor and the zoo provided the materials.

Nathan reports that his parents brought sandwiches, cookies and plenty of water to keep the boys working in the summer heat. Mike and Dixie are members of McCabe. Nathan is a senior in high school and is interested in doing college work to prepare for medical school. He assists with the Say Yes program at McCabe.



These boys are a part of the Boy Scout troop at the 1st Presbyterian Church in Bismarck and are to be commended for their achievement. The final step in the process will be a Court Of Honor ceremony where the awards will be presented.

Christmas Shoe boxes...

Oh yes, it is time already! Time flies quickly and it is time to begin to collect items for our shoe boxes now, so that they are ready for pickup mid November and distribution early in December. If you are unfamiliar with this program, simply put, this shoe box may very well be the only gift that the children of the Spirit Lake Reservation receive. There are about 4000 children and each year the churches of North and South Dakota answer the need. This is the 8th year that McCabe has participated and with each year the number of boxes we donate increases . . . let's keep up that good pace.

This is a simple project. Wrap a shoebox, top and bottom separately, and then fill it with whatever you think a child of the age you pick will like. Put a rubber band around the box and mark it with a gift tag indicating the age and gender and bring it to the church. Because of the difficulty in matching sizes only hats, mittens and scarves would be put into the boxes. Other clothing may be donated and will be distributed separately.

Stop at the display in the Great Hall and pick up a list of the following age groups and suggestions as to items to be given:

Infants-2 years: baby powder, bibs, blankets, bottles, infant toys.

Girls 3-5 and 6-8: age appropriate education items, reading books, dolls, stuffed animals, crayons, watercolor paints or markers, games, puzzles, hair accessories, hats, mittens, gloves, scarves

Boys 3-5 and 6-8: age appropriate educational items, cars, trucks, coloring/painting books, watercolors, markers, construction toys, Legos, reading books, games, puzzles, card games, hats, scarves, gloves, mittens.

Older girls 9-12 and 13-17: they love purses, makeup, nail polish, hair accessories, hair products, perfume, games, puzzles, reading books, hats, gloves, mittens, scarves.

Older guys 9-12 and 13-17: electronic handheld games, card games, watches, flashlights, reading books, hats, mittens, gloves

You may also donate and bring:

- Winter coats, snow pants, boots
- New children's underwear and sox
- Diapers and layette items
- Children's Christian videos
- New school backpacks and school supplies

Reading books for all ages
Musical instruments

All items and/or boxes need to be brought to the church by Sunday , November 11th. This is a project of the Dakotas Conference and is run by Mike and Libby Flowers who are missionaries to the Spirit Lake Reservation.

McCabe Youth

What motivates youth to continue in their faith in Christ throughout their life? I just finished reading a book entitled *Almost Christian* by Kendra Creasy Dean. In the book she talks about how many Christian youth do not have a very solid faith due to church's often lackluster attempts at showing and teaching true Christianity. She argues that much of what passes for Christianity in America is actually what she calls Moralistic Therapeutic Deism. This is a belief which offers an "easy-to-swallow" version of Christianity. Using the example of the rich young ruler in Matthew 19, she explains that Christ's point in dealing with this man was that you must be willing to sacrifice or even suffer if you want to truly follow Christ. This is not always easy for us American Christians to grasp. Christ also calls us to think big and recognize the great plan He has for each of us. Dean says,

"If American churches are thinking small, there is a reason: Moralistic Therapeutic Deism sets our sights on ourselves, not the stars. Yet a missionary imagination inspired by the gospel requires the church, above all, to think big: to lash our ambitions to the cross, and set our hopes on Jesus Christ, who established the church for the world, nothing less...which means that we are not here, any of us, for ourselves."

One of my goals as youth director is to challenge our youth to not be conformed to the world. In our fame-obsessed culture, the questions we ask ourselves often are how can I make my life better and how can I make my life easier? If I only had more money, or more clothes, or if more people liked me, then I'd be happy. The truth is Christ calls us to true happiness only through the gospel and by abandoning ourselves to His will. Jesus says in Matthew 5 that you are blessed when you are poor, mourning, empty, and persecuted. Not exactly the picture most of us think about when we think about being happy.

The truth is we all need to be reminded about God's love and His greatness every day so that we can be reminded of how insignificant we really are. It's easy to think about how our life is all about us and forget about how it really should be about loving God and loving people. Sometimes that means getting out of our comfort zones and doing something new we've never done before.

This is what it takes to shake kids out of their thinking that Christ is all about making them feel good rather than challenging them to rise above their obstacles. I pray that we will all be willing to follow Christ wherever He leads us in the future, even if we don't like what that means. True discipleship means sacrifice and God's blessing will follow. May our whole church embrace Christ's call for our lives.


Reading Program: Our Program Resources director, Pat Martin, has offered each Circle the opportunity for a presentation about our reading program at the McCabe Library.


